*I*N Pursuance of His Majesty's Commands, these are to give Publick Notice, that it is expected, that upon the present Occasion of the Death of his late Royal Highness, HENRY FREDERICK, Duke of Cumberland and Strathern, all Persons do put themselves into decent Mourning, to begin on Sunday next, the 26th Instant.

THE Procession to be from the Prince's Chamber, through the Old-Palace Yard, to the South-East Door of Westminster Abby. At the Entrance, within the Church, the Dean and Prebendaries, attended by the Choir, receive the Body, and fall into the Procession just before the Officer of Arms who precedes the Lord Chamberlain, and so proceed into King Henry VIIIth's Chapel, where the Body is to be placed on Trestles, the Head towards the Altar; the Coronet and Cushion being laid upon the Coffin, and the Canopy held over it, while the Service is read by the Dean of Westminster. The Chief Mourner and his Two Supporters sitting on Chairs placed for them at the Head of the Corpse; the Lords Assitants and the Supporters of the Pall being nearest the Body.

The Part of the Service before the Interment being read, the Corpse is to be deposited in the Vault.

The Body being interred, the Dean goes on with the Office of Burial; which ended, Quarter King of Arms proclaims His Royal Highness's Stile, which ends the Ceremony.

Minute Guns to be fired as usual.

N.B. All Persons are desired to attend at the Princes Chamber by Eight O'Clock in the Evening.
